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overview

...Rather train yourself for godliness; for while bodily training is of some value, godliness is of value in every way, as it holds promise for the present life and also for the life to come. I Timothy 4:7-8

Godliness matters! It's worth our pursuit and effort and training. The word "Train" is defined as follows:

(tran) v. trained, train ing, trains

- 1) To coach in or accustom to a mode of skilled behavior or performance.
- 2) To make proficient or qualified with specialized instruction discipline, drill and practice.
- 3) To prepare physically, as with a regimen, for a test of skill: train athletes for track-and-field competition.
- 4) To cause (a plant or one's hair) to take a desired course or shape by bending, pruning or tying
- 5) To focus on or aim at (a goal, mark, or target); direct. *v. intr.*
- 1) To give or undergo a course of training: trained daily for the marathon.

This is what we want to do together this semester: To work hard and train ourselves to trust God and all that He reveals about how He designed life. The study looks at 10 different characteristics that flow out of our trust in God. Prayerfully and diligently approach Him as you complete these studies. And encourage one another as you meet and discuss all God is revealing. (Hebrews 10:24,25).

Jerry Bridges says about training in godliness, "Godliness is more than Christian character. It covers the totality of the Christian life and provides the foundation upon which Christian character is built. We are to train ourselves to be godly. We are to pursue godliness—the word "pursue" indicating unrelenting, persevering effort. It is both the privilege and duty of every Christian to pursue godliness, and to train himself to be godly, to study diligently the practice of godliness."


Here's the key though: Training is more than "just try harder!" The promise of our new life in Christ is that God has "given us everything we need for life and godliness." (2 Peter 1:3) He has given us a new heart (Ezekiel 36:26,27) with new power (2 Corinthians 5:17) and new desires (Romans 6:17). So, while it *will* take effort, our effort can be directed at letting the new life God implanted in us to seep out.

Our growth in godliness is much ike a tree, which must drink deeply and expose itself to sun and fight against pests and disease (that's a lot of work) but who grows from the inside out by a power far beyond its ability. Godliness is already in you, let it out!

May this semester be another 'ring' in your growth as we together trust God and search the Scriptures.

importance of the Scriptures

As we pursue Godliness through our relationship with Jesus Christ, it is necessary that we grow in our conviction and ability to get a "grasp" on God's Word. As you work through this study, seek to implement the various elements (fingers) of this Hand Illustration. As you take the time in these channels of grace, your relationship with and experience of God grows.



The "Word Hand" shows five very important methods of relating to God through his word.

HEARING

Romans 10:17

Hearing the Word from godly pastors and teachers provides insight into others' study of the Scriptures as well as stimulating your own appetite for the Word.

READING

Deuteronomy 17:19,20

Reading the Bible gives an overall picture of God's Word. Many people find it helpful to use a daily reading program that takes them systematically through the Bible.

STUDYING

Acts 17:11

Studying the Scriptures leads to personal discoveries of God's truths. Writing these discoveries down helps you organize and remember them.

MEMORIZING

Psalm 119:9, 11

Memorizing God's Word enables use of the Sword of the Spirit to overcome Satan and temptations...to have it readily available for witnessing or helping others with a "word in season."

MEDITATING

Psalm 1:2, 3

Meditation is the thumb of the Word Hand, for it is used in conjunction with each of the other methods. Only as you meditate on God's Word--thinking of its meaning and application in your life--will you discover its transforming power at work within you.

how to do this study

The Training in Godliness Bible Study is composed of three sections each week:

- 1. developing Biblical framework
- 2. key passage section
- 3. developing a practical emphasis

The first and third sections are focused on developing a broad Biblical framework and practical emphasis for the subject at hand. In these sections, we will explore our own background on the subjects, explore the wisdom of other saints, and look throughout the Scriptures to build a foundation for the Big picture of God's revelation that will help us to grasp an understanding of His Truth. These sections will have practical elements to them to help us focus on applying God's Word to our lives. This is the chief aim of our study, namely, "That we would live lives worthy of Him who calls us into His Kingdom and Glory" (I Thes. 2:12) or as Colossians 1:10 says, "that you may walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, to please Him in all respects, bearing fruit in every good work and growing by the full participation in God."

The second section each week is the Key Passage Section. In this section, we will analyze a key text of scripture in an inductive manner. The Inductive approach looks at the whole text in its context and pulls out facts, interprets them, and then applies them. We will follow a basic Observation, Interpretation, Application outline. This is explained further in the following page but for the purpose of introduction:

<u>Observation</u> is carefully going over the text <u>to see what is going on</u>, the "who, what, where, when, how, and why." We want to pull out the facts through the nature of Scripture and to avoid presumptions and fallacies, because God's Word speaks for itself.

<u>Interpretation</u> is working to discover <u>what the author intended to communicate</u>. We want to interpret literally in the correct context. That is we never take out of God's Word what is not there, or read in our will as His.

<u>Application</u> is taking the plain meaning and putting it to practical use. We want to consider, <u>"how is God ask-ing me to trust him?</u>". What sin to get rid of, what commands to yield to, the pitfalls to avoid, the actions to engage in, and the promises we are to keep.

Additionally are sections for questions, which arise as you study, and definitions of key words. In the Response and Application sections, several questions are provided with each study to facilitate your conclusions and transformation into the likeness of Jesus. Also, use the back of the sheet to write out other ways in which the Spirit of God is directing you through His Word.

- Manner: How is the text saying it here? How is the emphasis here different than other places in Scripture?
- Motive: Why is the text saying this? What is the intent, why is it here, and what is the appropriate response?

Questions and Key Words:

Write down any questions that come to mind as you study the passage. These may be questions of structure, meaning or intent of the passage. Also, define any unknown or key words that are necessary to understand the passage better. Use an English dictionary or a Bible dictionary (such as Vine's) to determine the meanings of these words.

Application - What should my response be?

Faith is the goal of our Bible study. We want to put God's Word into practice–recognizing God's voice and responding in trust. The benefit of Bible study is not derived from the method, the technique, or the diligent efforts to decipher the text as an end in itself. The benefit is in seeing His eyes, understanding more of His heart and responding with your heart to Him. Application does not happen by chance–application is by intent.

In Romans 12:1-2, Paul urges us to offer our bodies as living sacrifices, not being conformed to the pattern of the world but transformed... Notice the passion in Paul's language "I urge you". If God has done so much (Rom. 1-11), our response of gratitude and faith moves us to action. From v.9 on, Paul has a string of commands, all intense in language and passionate in intent.

Sin disintegrates relationships. It brings guilt ("I did something wrong") AND shame ("I *am* something wrong".) The chart above is a look at the effect of shame. Do you resonate with the concpet of shame? How so?

Shame always creates a fear of being known. Intimacy and trust are seen as threats rather than invitations to a full life. We avoid forgiveness and resoration. We believe lies about ourselves and others to maintain a defensive detachment that feels safe. Yet, as we saw earlier God calls us to an unwavering commitment to love others and face our fears with honesty. But how?
